Rubbish Rivals

Before you read

Tell the class that the story is about a man who invents a recycling machine. Explain that most people in Europe throw away 10 times their bodyweight in rubbish every year and that we need to reuse and recycle things a lot more. Write *Recycle* and *Reuse* as headings on the board and elicit one or two things that people recycle and reuse. Then ask the children to work in pairs and make a list under each heading. For example:

Recycle: drinks cans, plastic milk bottles, newspapers.

Reuse: paper clips, plastic bags, plastic drinks bottles.

Share ideas as a class and discuss what the children recycle and reuse at home and at school.

While you read

Stop reading at the bottom of page 10 where Lady Goff says *I'll destroy you*. Read out the following True/False statements to check comprehension of the story so far: *There's an explosion at Wally Walker's house* (True); *Specks invents a robot* (False, it's a recycling machine); *The recycling machine is perfect* (False); *The big man called Clott is taking photos of the Walkers* (True); *Clott works for Lady Goff* (True); *Sir Mortimer's got a son called David* (False, his name's Henry); *Lady Goff wants the recycling machine* (True).

After you read

Brainstorm things children can do to be "green" and write them on the board: *reuse plastic bags, turn off lights, write on both of a piece of paper, recycle plastic bottles, give clothes to a charity shop, buy recycled paper, etc.* Give each child a sheet of recycled paper and ask them to draw a big leaf shape on the paper. In the leaf, tell them to write a green resolution. For example: *I'm going to reuse plastic bags, I'm going to recycle drink cans, etc.* The children then decorate their leaves and cut them out. Collect the leaves and stick them to a tree trunk and branches made of card on a display board.

Using the worksheets

Worksheet 1

Complete the character descriptions.

Ask the children to look at the picture and description of Lady Goff and ask *Do you like Lady Goff?* Elicit children's answers and reasons. Next, write the following answers on the board: *America/Sir Mortimer Goff/big/Wally Walker/black*. Tell the students to work in pairs and complete the description of Lady Goff with the answers. Give the class two minutes and then check answers: *She's got big eyes and wears a black dress. She is married*

to Sir Mortimer Goff. She's from America. She hates Wally Walker.

Write the answers for the other character descriptions in random order on the board and ask the children to complete them:

Specks: *glasses; recycling machine; Wally Walker; password*

Wally Walker: *Tom; Lady Goff; fat; Lizzie; Lady Goff; Clott*

Clott: *works; recycling machine; T-shirt; Specks; rats*

Worksheet 2

How green are you? Tick (✓) the right answers for you.

Explain to the class that they are going to do a questionnaire about being "green" and helping protect the environment. Write the first question on the board: *Do you turn off the TV when you're not watching it? always/sometimes/never*. Check that the children understand the question and adverbs then ask volunteers for their answers to the question.

Hand out the questionnaires and explain the following vocabulary: *charity shop* (question 5); *tap, brush your teeth* (question 8); *heating* (question 9). Tell the children to complete the questionnaires. Then tell them to total their scores and read the corresponding comment. Ask volunteers to tell the class what score they got in the questionnaire and about the things they do to be "green".

Worksheet 3

Crack the code!

Hand out the worksheets and ask the children to look at the grid. Explain that it shows a code. Then tell the children to look at the first code word. Using the grid, work out the first word as a class. Then tell the children to use the grid to work out the remaining words. Check answers as a class.

Finally, ask the children to each think of a word and then represent the letters of the word with symbols from the grid. Children exchange codes with a partner and then crack each other's codes.

Extension

Prepare a notice on recycled paper that says: *Be green! Turn off the light*. Illustrate it with a picture of a finger turning off a switch. Show the class the notice and tell them that they are going to make some notices to put up at home to remind the people in their family to take care of the environment. Elicit ideas for the notices: *Turn off the TV when you're not watching it, Reuse plastic bags*. Then give each child three pieces of paper and tell them to prepare three notices. Encourage the children to show the notices to their family and display them at home.

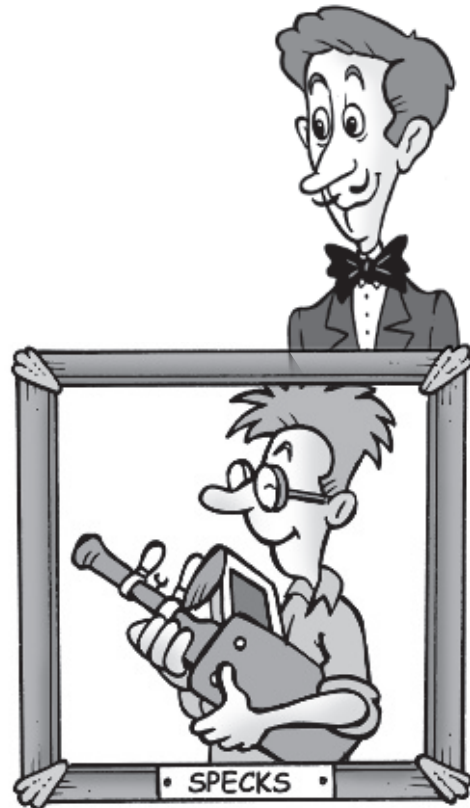

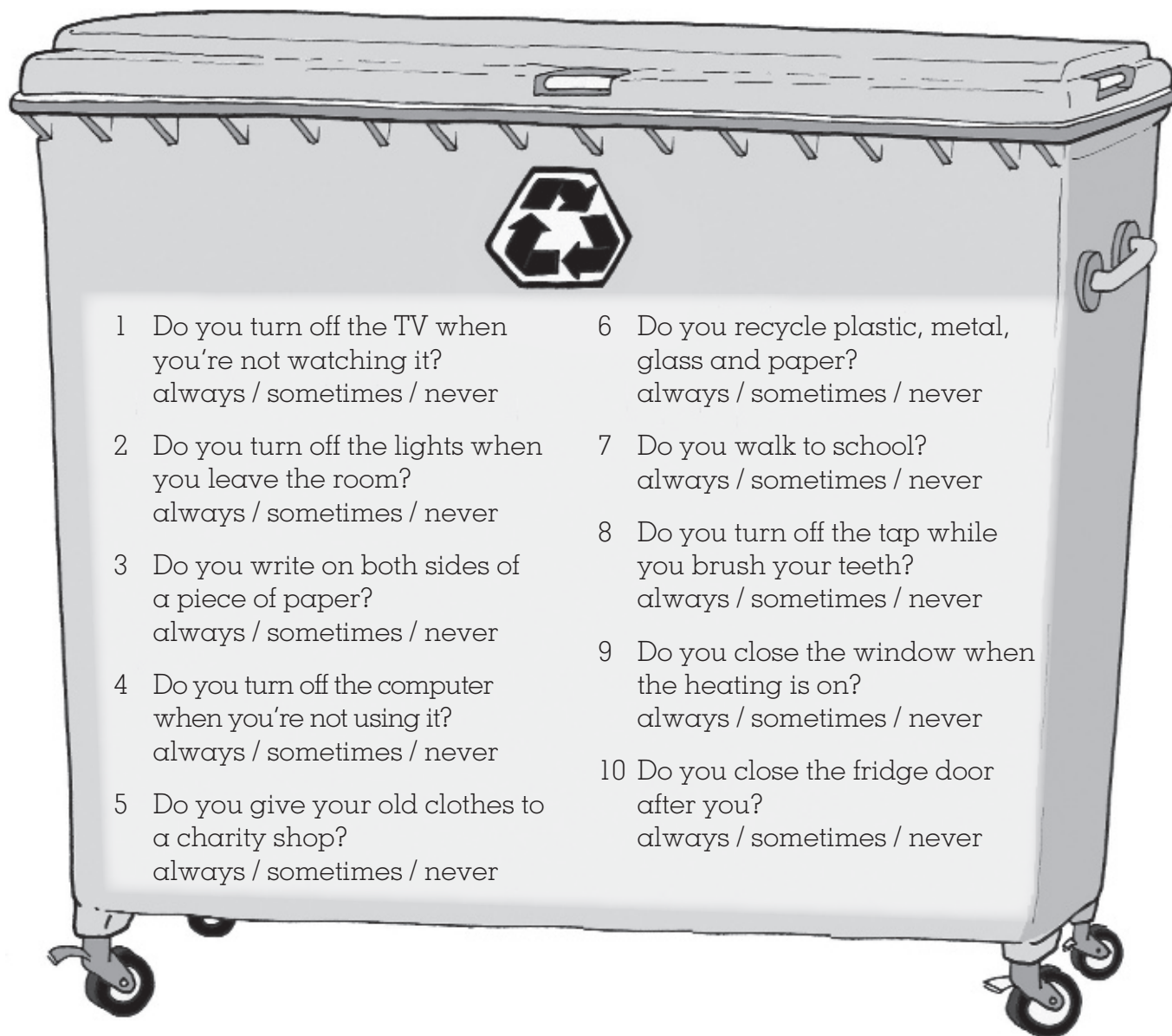

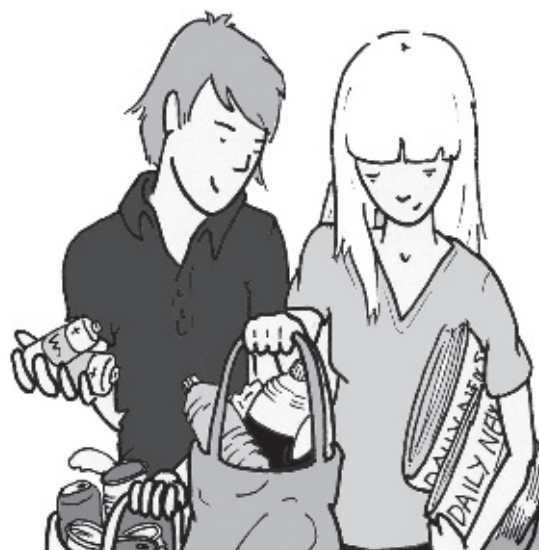

DVD Scripts

School Interviews

Victoria: This is a public school. Well, actually it's a private school. Most parents pay a lot of money for their children to come here.

Jasmine: My name is Jasmine and I come from Hong Kong. My typical day starts off with swimming in the morning at six o'clock. Then I have breakfast in the house and then I have double Chemistry in the science labs. After double Chemistry I have double French in the language centre and then I have double volleyball in the hall. Hopefully, when I leave I'm going to go to university but I'm not sure what I'm going to do.

Victoria: What subjects do you study?

Camilla: I study French, English, Art and Philosophy.

Suresh: I study Maths, English, Science, Media Studies, French, History and IT.

Georgina: I study French, History, Media Studies, Maths and Science.

Indira: I study Art, Science. I study Classical Civilization and Sixteenth Century History.

Victoria: Now, this is a comprehensive school. Education is free and about sixteen hundred students come here. They start at the age of eleven and go on till sixteen or finish at eighteen if they are going on to university.

Alex: My name's Alex. We get to school at quarter to eight and have registration. We have to be at school on time and we have to be punctual to lessons and we have to wear our uniform and we have to do our homework. We have to wear a red jumper, black trousers and black shoes. We have five lessons, which are an hour long each. Today, for example, we have Chemistry and Art. We call our teachers "Sir" or "Miss". I like my school because the classrooms are attractive and we have large playing fields and lots of other activities after school. There's nothing I don't like about my school.

Money and Clothes

Victoria: Hi. This is Spitalfields Market in London. It's a Sunday market. It's open every Sunday. But what exactly can you buy here? This used to be a fruit and vegetable market in the old days. Clothes here are a bit more expensive than other markets. How do you get the money? I save up my pocket money and do odd jobs for my parents. Some kids have part-time jobs, like delivering newspapers. What do you think? No, I don't like it either. So, what is street fashion?

Woman: I think street fashion is colourful, cheap, it's individual.

Victoria: So, how much are you spending today on clothes?

Woman: I'll probably spend about fifty pounds.

Victoria: What's street fashion?

Stall holder: It's what people wear on the streets.

Victoria: So how much do teenagers usually spend on clothes?

Stall holder: About twenty pounds, not a lot of money.

Victoria: What's street fashion?

Maddy: Street fashion to me is individual clothing.

Victoria: What kind of clothes do you like?

Grazia: I like London street fashion clothes.

Eddie: I like baggy clothes, darker colours, greens, browns, jackets, jeans.

Maddy: I like quite colourful clothes. I make a lot of my own clothes though.

Frank: I like practical clothes. I like warm clothes on a day like today.

Victoria: So, how much do you spend on clothes?

Grazia: I spend about two hundred pounds a month on clothes.

Eddie: I spend between twenty and a hundred pounds a month.

Maddy: Probably about a maximum of about twenty quid.

Frank: I spend as little as possible on clothes.

Victoria: Where do you buy your clothes?

Grazia: At markets or in boutiques or shops in different places in London.

Eddie: I buy all my clothes in the markets. I don't buy any from the shops.

Frank: I buy my clothes anywhere other than London because it's expensive here.

Victoria: What's your favourite piece of clothing?

Grazia: My favourite item at the moment is this bag. It actually comes from Italy.

Maddy: My favourite piece of clothing...I've got a really nice sequined top.

Eddie: My favourite piece of clothing is this jacket.

Frank: My favourite piece of clothing is this because it's got a hood to keep me warm.

Victoria: What do you wear when you want to dress up?

Grazia: When I want to dress up I wear something new in my wardrobe.

Frank: Oh, usually one of my uncle's old suits is what I put on when I want to dress up.

Victoria: I'm going to a party on Saturday. This'll look great. How much is that?

Stall holder: Twenty pounds.

Victoria: Thank you.

Victoria: OK.

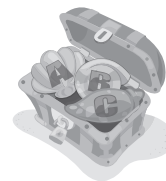
Assistant: How would you like the money?

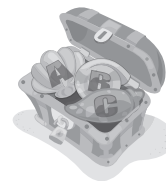

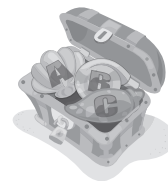

Before you read

Say: *Let's talk about Australia!* Show the class the cover of the book and explain that it's about a boy called Simon who lives in Australia. Display a map or globe and ask a volunteer to come and point out Australia. Ask the class questions to elicit what they know about Australia: What's the capital city? (Canberra); What languages do people speak in Australia? (English is the first language but there are also lots of people who speak Chinese, Italian and Greek); What animals live in Australia? (Kangaroos, Koalas and Duck-billed platypus are all native to Australia. It's also common to farm sheep and cows); What's the climate like? (There are different biomes including desert, rainforest and grassland).

While you read

Ask the children to stop reading on pages 10 and 11. Ask them to say how they think Simon is feeling and then ask them to say what they would do if they saw a shark this close. Ask the children if they've had any scary experiences like this and invite them to tell the class.

After you read

Write Simon on the board in a circle and draw four arrows coming from the circle. At the end of each arrow, write a title: school, hobbies, family, home. Point to school and elicit information about Simon: He doesn't go to school, he studies at home and talks to his teacher with a webcam. Then ask the children to look back at the story in pairs and make notes about Simon for the other titles.

Using the worksheets

Worksheet 1

Look at the story and solve the puzzle.

Explain that the crossword is all about the Rock Pool story. Write the clue for 3 across on the board: Simon's website is about _ _ _ _ _ animals. Ask the children to suggest how to complete the clue (ocean), then tell them to complete the crossword looking back at the story when necessary.

Tell the children that Simon's got an animal in his bucket and that they're going to do a puzzle to find out what it is. Write the first clue on the board:

Elicit the two missing words (crab and waves) and ask the class to look at the words and say which letter they have in common (a). Then tell them to write the letter a on the first line in Simon's speech bubble. Ask children to solve the remaining clues to reveal the mystery animal.

Take the ocean animals quiz!

Give out the quiz, write the following key vocabulary on the board and check children's understanding: whale, heart, octopus, blood, brain, backwards. Then instruct them to look at the questions in pairs but mark their answers individually. Explain that the aim of the quiz is to learn new things about ocean animals and they should make a guess when they don't know an answer. Then go through each question

and tell the children the answers. Tell children to count how many answers they had right and see if they had more or less than their partner.

Extension

Play a game: divide the class into groups and give each group a sheet of paper. Give the groups a minute to make a list of all the sea animals they can think of in English. Stop the groups after a minute and give them a point for each word on their list. Continue the game with other categories: technology words, farm animals, countries and so on.

Bear Grylls, a famous adventurer

Bear Grylls is a famous adventurer who knows a lot about nature and survival. He was born on 7th June, 1974, on the Isle of Wight in Great Britain. (His name was Edward Michael Grylls, but he officially changed it to Bear; his school nickname, later on.) As a child, he often went mountain climbing with his dad.

Bear has got an impressive list of achievements. He has received a black belt in karate. He has written four books about survival, and he has starred in a number of educational TV programmes. He has also had TV interviews with Oprah Winfrey, David Letterman and Jay Leno. In addition, he has organized several events to raise money for children's charities around the world, including having a dinner party high in the air on a hot-air balloon.

Bear Grylls started his career in the British army. He learned how to fight without weapons and



how to survive in the wild. Unfortunately, he had a terrible parachuting accident in Africa. His parachute didn't open, and he broke his back in three places. It took a long time for him to recover, but he never forgot his dream to climb Mount Everest.

He soon realized his dream. In 1998, he became the youngest British person ever to climb Mount Everest. And in 2007 he flew a paraglider over Mount Everest! He used the experience to earn money for charities.

Bear is married to author Shara Grylls, and they've got two sons, Jesse and Marmaduke.

Jazz music began in the late 1800s in New Orleans, USA. It was a combination of the music styles from European immigrants and songs called **spirituals**, developed by African slaves a century earlier.

One of the main characteristics of jazz music is **improvisation**. It means that the musicians don't use sheet music, musical notes written on paper, as in classical music. Jazz musicians can change the music according to how they feel when they play, to express **emotions**. That's what makes jazz very flexible.

In jazz music, **rhythm** is especially important. Many styles of jazz music use a **swing** rhythm. That means there's a long beat and a short beat repeated in the song: "DOO-do DOO-do DOO-do DOO-do DOO-do DOO."

Another important characteristic of jazz music is the way musicians use tones that aren't in most kinds of music. In other words, they use sounds that you can't even find on

a piano — they're in between those notes! They call those special tones **blue notes**. When you feel blue, you feel sad. Blue notes give the music an unusual sad or relaxed sound. Maybe one of the most recognizable ways to identify jazz music is through the instruments: the piano, trumpet, saxophone, clarinet, drums, trombone, and **double bass** — like an enormous violin that marks the rhythm in soft, low notes.

Sometimes other instruments are used — flutes or even electric guitars. We can't forget how amazing jazz singers can be. Their unforgettable voices pull the music together with words. The voices of jazz greats like Ella Fitzgerald and Billie Holiday are still the favourites.

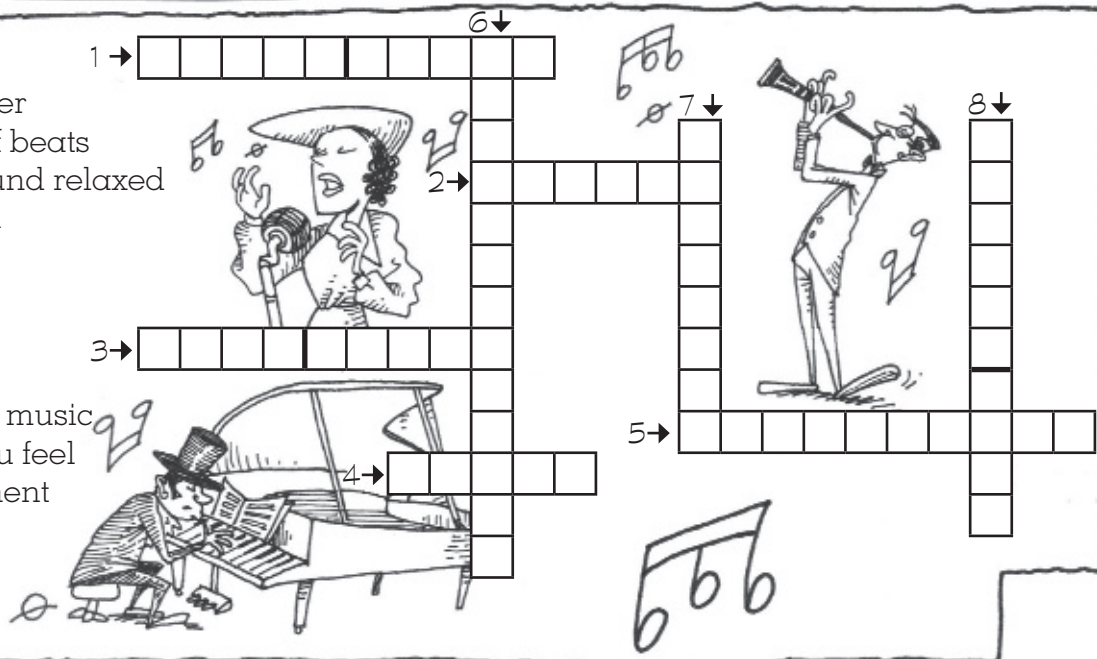

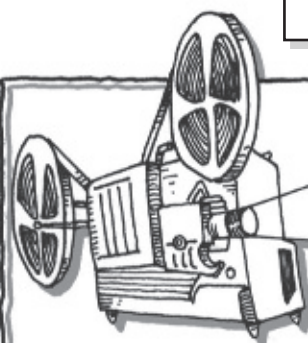

The history of films

We all love films, but did you know that the concept of the motion picture has been around for almost two thousand years?

With their invention, the **cinématographe**, the Lumière brothers created several very short films that amazed audiences. In 1897 Paris became the home of the first permanent cinema, and two years later Georges Méliès created the first science fiction film. It was about a trip to the moon, and it lasted 14 minutes.

Around the same time, photography was developing. In 1869 scientists invented a kind of film that could save series of moving photos inside a camera. In 1895 Louis and Auguste Lumière invented the **cinématographe**, a portable camera that could also be used to process and project film.

The United States' film industry was beginning to grow, and people began to build small cinemas, called nickelodeons. They were very popular, and by 1908 there were eight thousand of them in U.S. cities.

Films became popular immediately, and soon companies were producing 90-minute films. They were called silent films because there was no way to record the sound of the actors. They weren't completely silent, though. They usually had recorded or live music in the background.

By the 1920s, the film studios began making films in Hollywood, California. They soon developed ways of recording actors' voices and the modern film was born. These films were called **talkies**. They also began making films in colour, which was very expensive at that time. The 1930s brought in "The Golden Age of Hollywood," with mass production of films, including musicals and animated films, that we still watch today.

The first moving-picture device was the zoetrope, invented by Ting Huan in China around 180 AD. It was a cylinder with paintings inside. By spinning the cylinder, you could see the illusion that paintings were moving. The idea, however, was mostly forgotten until the nineteenth century, when many inventors began experimenting with optical toys using small drawings and paintings.

They learned how to paint, and the money from their artwork pays for their training. You can watch videos of them, or buy note cards of their paintings, online. Finally, there's Buddy the pony. He's got a serious disease called equine cushing's disease. Doctors and veterinarians don't know that much about this disease. Lance Armstrong was born on 18th September, 1971, in the USA. His name at that time was Lance Edward Gunderson. His parents, Linda Walling and Eddie Gunderson, named him after a football player, Lance Rentzel. His father left the family when Lance was two years old, and his mother married Terry Armstrong, who adopted Lance and gave him his last name.

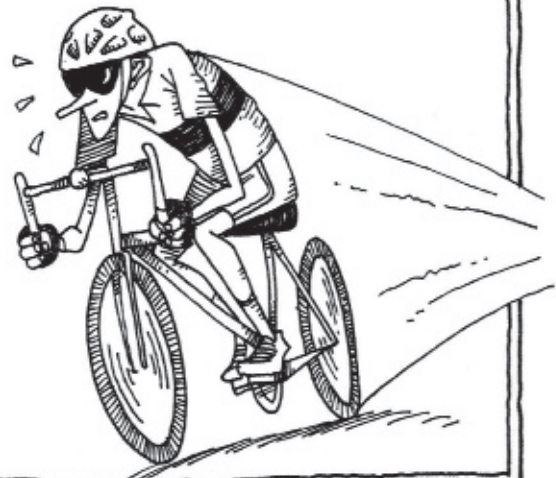
As a child, Lance loved sport and began competing in triathlons when he was 12 years old. (A triathlon is a sporting event where you have to swim, ride a bike and run as part of a race.) Lance Armstrong became a professional athlete in 1987, when he was only 16 years old. He participated in many events and did especially well with biking (or cycling) events. In 1993 he was the highest-ranking cyclist in the world. In 1995 and 1996, Lance Armstrong competed in many other races and won some, but he was not spectacular. He came 12th in the 1996 Olympic Games. Later that year, he was diagnosed with cancer. It was in many different parts of his body, and doctors did not expect him to survive. His treatment, however, was very effective, and he returned to racing in 1998.

By 2005, Lance Armstrong had seven consecutive victories in the famous Tour de

Lance Armstrong is a symbol for excellence in sports and strength in fighting cancer. Because of his own illness, he created the Lance Armstrong Foundation, with its motto LIVESTRONG®, to raise awareness about cancer and teach people that they can survive the disease. It also aims to teach people healthy habits so that with or without cancer, they can live well.

We all know that a diet of chocolate bars and crisps will make you feel sick, and that it's important to eat enough fruit and vegetables. But have you thought about the things you drink?

When people think about healthy habits, many forget that drinking enough water is essential. Your body needs water more than any other substance - except air, of course!

Did you know that more than half of your body weight is water? It cleans your body's cells. It helps to maintain the balance of salt and other minerals in your body. It also keeps your skin and your internal organs healthy. When you drink water regularly, you feel better and will probably have fewer health problems. But the water in your body is constantly escaping. On a hot day, or after exercise, this water comes out of your skin when you **sweat**. You also lose water when you go to the toilet.

Because of this, you need to **replenish** your water **supply** regularly. That means drinking enough water

and other **beverages** during the day. Some of the water that your body needs comes from food, so you don't need to drink more than two litres of water.

But remember, when you're thirsty, it's much better to drink water than **sugar- and caffeine-loaded** fizzy drinks, or juice drinks have only got a small **percentage** of real juice in them.

When you don't consume enough water, your body can become **dehydrated**. That means it hasn't got enough water to function well. You might get a headache. Your mouth will feel dry, and you won't be able to eliminate the **toxins** in your cells. Dehydration is very dangerous, and if you become very dehydrated, you can get very ill or even die. However, you can also get very ill if you drink too much water. That's **water intoxication** which happens when you drink a large quantity of water.

Balance is important, and the key to good health. Drink one to two litres of water a day and you'll see the difference!

Leonardo da Vinci painted this 77 cm x 53 cm beauty. It is now one of the most famous portraits in history, but nobody knows for sure who the woman was or the reason for her unusual smile. Some historians believe that the woman's name was Lisa Gherardini del Giocondo.

Leonardo started the painting in 1503 in Florence, Italy, and took a few years to complete it. Some people believe it was Leonardo's favourite work and that is why he didn't want to sell it. Finally it was sold to the king of France for lots of money, and was placed in the Louvre, a royal palace.

After the French Revolution, Napoleon Bonaparte liked the Mona Lisa so much that he took it to decorate his bedroom. When he was defeated,

authorities returned the painting to the Louvre, which was converted to a museum, where it safely remained for almost a century.

Then, in 1911, a thief stole the painting from its place in the Louvre. The search for the great work of art made the painting famous around the world. Police found it two years later, when a man offered to sell the painting for £50,000.

Today, to protect the Mona Lisa, it is kept in a thick, glass box in the Louvre. It hangs in the Salle d'États and is visited by millions of people every year.

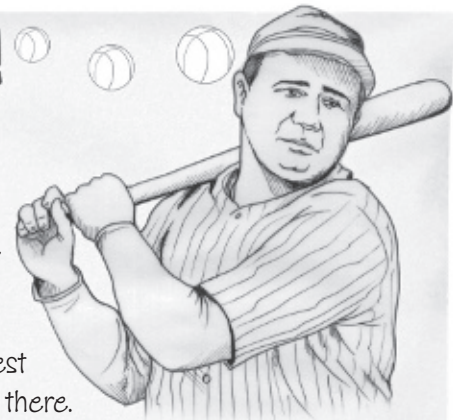


Babe Ruth, the Home Run King!



George Herman Ruth, known as "Babe Ruth," was one of the first sports superstars. He was born on 6th February, 1895, in Baltimore, Maryland. He had 1 sister named Mamie. Ruth's parents were very poor, so they sent him to an orphanage when he was 7 years old. There he learned how to play baseball. By the age of 15, he was playing for his school team. At the age of 19, Ruth had his first professional contract. He was a pitcher (the player who throws the ball) but he quickly developed a greater reputation as a hitter (the player who hits the ball with a bat). In 1930 Ruth was earning a salary of \$80,000 a year for the New York

Yankees. In the third game of the 1932 World Series against the Chicago Cubs at Wrigley Field, Babe hit the longest home run ever hit there. At the time of his retirement, he had an impressive record of 714 home runs. After baseball, Ruth lived a quiet life with his wife, Claire. When he died in 1948, more than 100,000 people went to his funeral. His shirt, number 3, was retired that same year.

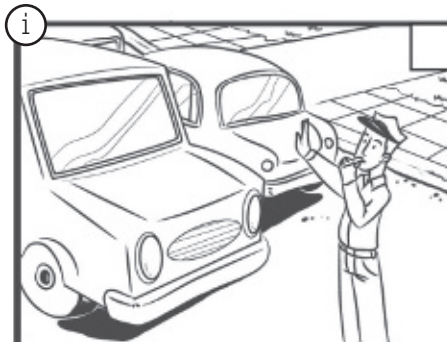
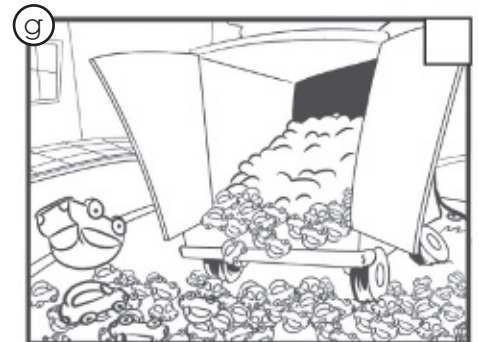
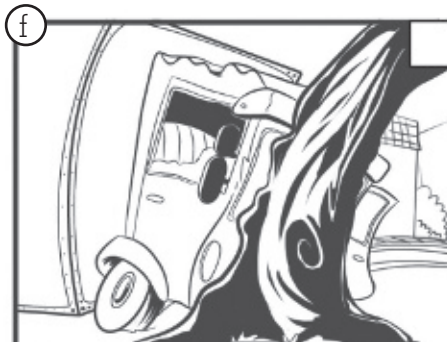
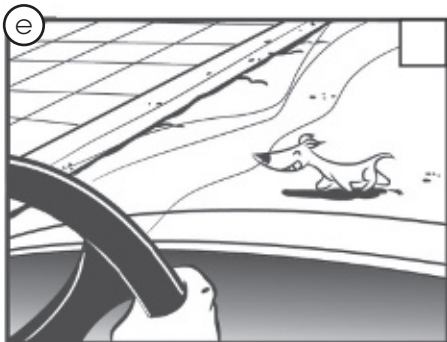
Unfortunately, the lorry's back door opened and thousands of little toy cars fell out onto the street and rolled away in every direction. Other vehicles could not pass through the area, and people

Unfortunately, they couldn't." The streets were clear by 11.30 a.m.

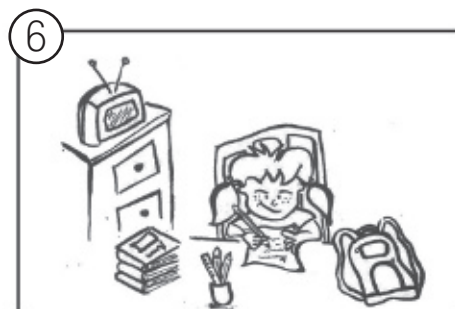

Young Learner & Trinity Exams

Tips for the Test - YLE and Trinity

The **Cambridge Young Learner** exams are designed for children aged from 7 to 12 years old. They are tested normally in their own school environment or an exam centre, and the exams all follow the same format. There are three levels: Starters, Movers and Flyers. In terms of grammar and lexis, the Flyers level is on par with the KET exams. The difference is that, unlike the exams for older students, children cannot fail the YLE. Every participant is given a diploma with badges in Reading, Writing, Listening and Speaking. The badges are coloured in depending on the success of the candidate.

Exams follow a very set format. The children never write on the exam papers, rather they answer on an answer sheet, usually with one word answers. They are tested in groups, except for the Speaking session, where the test is given individually.

The Lighthouse YLE CD-ROM includes three complete tests. These can be printed out in colour and used for classroom practice; one set can be used many times. The children write their answers on a piece of paper except for the last page of the Listening exams, which is used for colouring and therefore can only be used once.

Tips

- When doing the practice exams it is best to recreate similar circumstances as when the students will do the exam themselves, allow them the same amount of time, and have them practise exam techniques.
- The ESOL web site has an abundance of exam tips as well as more practice activities and information about the exams.
- The interactive activities on the CD-ROM are divided into the different sections of the exams. This way the teacher may choose to practice the same exam question in various exams or practise once complete exam, or pick and choose activities from different exams.

Trinity College London, Graded Examinations in Spoken English

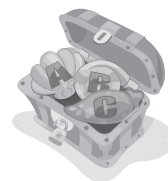
The Trinity Examinations in Spoken English are one-to-one oral examinations with a native English speaking Trinity examiner, which test a student's speaking and listening skills. The exams provide an official recognition of a student's level of spoken English and are accepted by universities and employers worldwide. Candidates must be aged 7 or over.

The examinations are divided into a series of 12 oral exams which test the student's general conversation and ability to discuss prepared topics. The exam grades range from absolute beginner level to near native fluency.

Apart from being a recognised meter of a student's skills in English, the examination also works as a motivational tool encouraging students to practise and try to communicate in English.

Tips

- In each English lesson, ask general questions such as *What day is it today? What's the weather like today? Is it spring or summer? How old are you?*
- Encourage full answers whenever asking questions. *T: What day is it today? SS: Tuesday. T: It's Tuesday.*
- When asking questions, if a child does not know the answer, encourage them to say *"I don't know"* or *"I can't remember"* or *"I'm sorry, I don't know the word in English"*, rather than remaining silent or saying *"errr"*.
- Make question practice fun. Do it in the form of a team quiz and award points. Or ask questions at the end of a lesson, whoever answers correctly can line up first.
- Practise for the exam in regular, short sessions so candidates become more confident with the style of question and can answer more rapidly and naturally.



- When choosing a grade for candidates, consider the child's personality as well as their level of English. A shy child with a good level of English, may not do as well as a more outgoing child who speaks more spontaneously.
- Encourage the children to ask questions too. From Level 2 onwards they are expected to ask the examiner questions.

Elementary Stage (Grades 4, 5 and 6)

This is a 10 minute exam which has 2 phases; a discussion on the candidate's pre-prepared topic and the conversation. Children should try to maintain a fluid conversation rather than just answering the examiner's questions.

Tips for preparing the topic

- Children should choose something that they are genuinely interested in and can talk easily about, (a hobby, pet, recent holiday...).
- They should collect all necessary photos or pictures well before the exam to give them time to plan the points and practice what to say.
- Children should not learn their topic by heart as they must speak naturally and spontaneously in the exam.
- Allow children the possibility of presenting their topic to the class and answering their questions to give them more confidence.
- The child should prepare several questions to ask the examiner related to their topic.
- Make a photocopy of the Topic Form for each student. Check that their information and spelling is correct before giving them the real Topic Form to complete.
